The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Agolla): Hon. Members, welcome back to this afternoon session. Mr. Clerk can you take us through the Order Paper of this afternoon.

Deputy Leader of Majority (Hon. Odhiambo): I would like to give a Notice of the following Motion;

Pursuant to Standing Orders No. 190 (3), (4) and (5) read together with Orders No. 236, 237 and 238 of the County Assembly Standing Orders. THAT, this House considers adopting a Report from the Committee of Procedure and Rules on the Proposed Amendments of the County Assembly Standing Orders – Leader of Majority (Hon. Kenneth Onyango).

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Agolla): Next Order!

STATEMENTS

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Agolla): Hon. Guya!

Hon. Guya: Thank you Mr. Speaker, please allow me to request for the following statement from the Department of Water, Environment and Natural Resources on the following issues;

1. What is the progress report on the removal of Kachok Dumpsite to Kajulu?
2. When is this programme expected to be completed?
3. How much money has been spent and how much money is the project expected to cost upon completion?
4. Does the land where the Kachok dumpsite exists belongs to the County Government or it is a private land?
5. What is the fate of the initial land that was purchased by the County Government that was to be used for the same use and what was the amount used to purchase that land and;
6. What is the size of that parcel of land?

Mr. Speaker, two, I also wish to seek for a statement from the County assembly Service Board. I wish to know;

1. How many casual or temporary staff does the County Assembly have as at 08th August, 2017?
2. How many casual or temporary staff that are currently serving in the County Government and what are their terms of engagement?
3. Are there plans by the government to employ additional stall and in which positions?

Thank you Mr. Speaker.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Agolla): Yes, Hon. Kanga!

Hon. Kanga: Thank you Mr. Speaker, I wish to seek a Statement from the Leader of Majority on a task force that was constituted by H.E. the Governor on the status of the following:

1. Status of the Pending Bill?
2. Task Force Establishment of the Village Councils?
3. Task Force Human Resource?
4. Task Force Environment and Infrastructure?
5. Task Force Health Services?
6. Task Force Revenue Collection?
7. Task Force on Land?

Mr. Speaker, these taskforces were given 90 days to accomplish their tasks and so far the timelines have elapsed. Mr. Speaker, I would also like to know;

1. Their Terms of Reference?
2. How much funds were allocated to these task Forces?

3. The House would also like to be furnished with a report which shows that the Task Forces have completed their work and that was handed over to the Government?

Mr. Speaker, I would wish that the Leader of Majority confirm to the House if these task force Reports have been handed over to the Government and mitigating measures taken to implement the findings of these reports?

Finally, I wish to remind the House that the Governor promised 100 days in his pillars of campaign that he would establish Village Councils, deal with the Kachok Dumpsite by relocations and he promised to constitute Road Maintenance Teams (RMTs) which were to be undertaken within the promised stipulated period. Mr. Speaker, the 100 days have elapsed and the House has not been furnished with the reports on the Task Forces and I would like the Leader of Majority to respond appropriately, thank you.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Agolla): Please Senior Member, Hon. Misachi!

Hon. Misachi: Thank you Mr. Speaker, I would like to seek a statement from the Leader of Majority to the Kisumu County Assembly Service Board. That, we be informed about the following issues:

1. Up to date, the majority of the Hon. Members have not received the complete disbursement of the car and Mortgage Loan facility?

Mr. Speaker, in the First Assembly, the seed money to this Account was to the tune of Kshs 250 million which was equivalent to Kshs 5 million per member and the interest was 3%. These monies were collected from the former Hon. Member in totality and we would have expected from that Account which would be transferable after servicing the facility to a tune of Kshs 264 million.

Mr. Speaker, I wonder why other Hon. Members have not been given their Car and Mortgage Loan facility in full and the time for repayment is running out. Mr. Speaker, Hon. Members for the last Assembly were to be paid Salaries, or remunerated up to March, 2018. This was quashed by the Courts and this is the amount that we are servicing now and there was amount to the tune of Kshs 108 million which was tailored towards the payment of these salaries. Mr. Speaker, before we rush for the Supplementary Estimates;

1. Can the County Assembly Service Board compute and show this House the money used, amount spent and the balances in the bank?

Mr. Speaker, why do I come up with such a Statement? This is because we are in a learning process and we have not been told by some of the Members who were in the First Assembly some of the Members did not complete servicing this facility and I wonder what the Board is

doing with regards to that, yet Members who are currently serving in the House now, are not able to access that money in full.

Mr. Speaker, I would also like the Leader of Majority to seek from the County Assembly Service Board (CASB) if it is true that the Executive did not remit Kshs 12 million from the amount that they were administering before transferring these facilities to the Assembly. Mr. Speaker, in totality;

1. We would like to know where Kshs 52, 510, 526.00 are which has necessitated other Members not to access this Car and Mortgage facility in full.

Mr. Speaker, could you do us a favour and furnish us with these statements in the next House sitting so that whatever we are doing is transparent. I rest my case, thank you.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Agolla): Hon. Members, I want to commit the following Statements:

1. Hon. Guya was seeking a Statement which I direct to the Committee of Water, Environment and Natural Resources so that they report back to this House within two weeks' time **Thursday, 08th March, 2018**. The Hon. Member and the House can be able to know what is required from this Department.
2. I want to commit the statement which was sought by Hon. Guya to the Office of the Leader of Majority so that they report back to this House in two weeks, **Thursday, 08th March, 2018**. He was seeking to know how many casual workers existed in County Assembly as at 08th August, 2017. The Leader of Majority to liaise with the CASB because he is the representative of Government Business and his Office will forward this statement to the Board.
3. I also want to commit a statement that was sought by Hon. Kanga in relation to H.E. the Governor's Government which was touching on the Pending Bills, Village Councils, Human Resource, Environment, Infrastructure, Health Services, Revenue Collections and land Task Forces. I equally commit this statement to the Office of the Leader of Majority and report back to this House within two weeks, **Thursday, 08th March, 2018**.
4. Finally, I want to commit the last statement sought by Hon. Misachi to the Office of the Majority Leader. He is expected to report back to this House within two weeks, **Thursday, 08th March, 2018** so that we continue and move on.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Agolla): Next Order!

MOTION

Deputy Leader of Majority (Hon. Odhiambo): I would like to move a motion on;

LONG TERM SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT POLICY FOR KISUMU COUNTY.

BY DEPUTY LEADER OF MAJORITY (HON. PAMELA ODHIAMBO)

Aware that under Part II of the Constitution of Kenya 2010, under functions of the County Government pursuant to Article 185, 186 and 187, Solid Waste Management has been devolved to Counties with specific mandates which include amongst “all matters relating to refuse removal, refuse dumps and solid waste disposal.”

Aware that the Kisumu County Solid Waste Management Act, 2014 provides for the establishment of Kisumu Solid Waste Management Board with various functions including the development of policies promoting efficient management of Solid Waste with the goal of protecting the County’s environment and Public Health.

Aware that the current re-allocation of Kachok dumpsite to Kajulu quarries is a short term measure that will only address the current eyesore situation along the highway.

In view of the above and aware that, Article 70 (1) of the Constitution of Kenya, 2010 provides that if a person alleges that a right to a clean and healthy environment recognized and protected under Article 42 has been, is being or is likely to be denied, violated, infringed or threatened, the person may apply to a Court for redress in addition to any other legal remedies that are available in respect to the same matter,

Mr. Speaker, I request this August House to deliberate on this pertinent issue and the County Executive Committee Member for Environment to give a policy statement on the long term solid waste management in the County. I would like to call upon Hon. Olima to second?

Hon. Kenneth Onyango

Leader of Majority

Chief Whip (Hon. Olima): Thank you Mr. Speaker, I rise to second the adoption of this motion on Long-term Solid Waste Management Policy for Kisumu County.

Mr. Speaker, I want to say that the issue of Solid Waste management has made Kisumu County be ranked number one on the negative side on Hygiene. We are all aware that the County Government of Kisumu is doing something better than what was done in the past and the policy we want adopted will ensure that we don’t retrogress back to where we were. This is because what is happening is short-term. We want to know how the new waste being produced within Kisumu County is going to be managed, which firms are going to do it and where it is going to be done.

We do not have a designated policy on how the residents can manage and dispose their waste. I want to say that the First Assembly did a wonderful job by legislating and passing the Kisumu County Solid Waste Management Act, 2014 and I wish to applaud them on the same, but I would like to request through the Chair that this Kisumu Solid Waste management Act, 2014 could have been given to the Committee of Implementation of this House to ensure that it is enforced because this is a piece of legislation that was thoroughly researched and a well-documented Act that if it would be given to the Committee on Implementation we can get better services for the residence of Kisumu County.

Mr. Speaker, I want to say that our Governor catapult in the promise of being a better manager on the same and we want to support him on undertaking these pillars so that at the end of the day his manifesto on Solid Waste Management can move concurrently with Solid Waste Management Act, 2014 of Kisumu County. Mr. Speaker, I want to state here that as an Assembly, we are in this menace today because of lack of the implementation element of the Act. We are here talking of the same because somebody somewhere is not doing his job well. I want to request this House that we stand up and be counted by so ensuring that anything that is going to pass through this Assembly in terms of Policy is scrutinized and is seen to be working for the Kisumu County residence.

Mr. Speaker, I want to support this motion so that we look at this issue critically and look into the future that going forward that how clean do we want Kisumu County to be? On that note thank you Mr. Speaker, I second.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Agolla): Hon. Members, now that the Motion on Long-term Solid Waste Management Policy for Kisumu County has been moved by the Deputy Leader of Majority and seconded by the Chief Whip, I now open the floor for debate?

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Agolla): Hon. Khan!

Hon. Khan: Thank you Mr. Speaker, my Party Orange Democratic Movement (ODM) had in its manifesto issues to do with Environmental Management. Mr. Speaker, when my leader was talking of the Mau Forest, he was opposed by some quarters and that is the reason as to why our people are not receiving rains. They are now wondering what went wrong because of the environmental aspects.

Mr. Speaker, Solid Waste Management also involves the environment. The few who can remember the Kisumu that was those days, it was a wonderful place. Mr. Speaker, the then Municipal Council of Kisumu used to provide dustbins to the residents. The Metal dustbin labeled MCK, every household had one at free disposal by the Council. On top of that, the Council used to give free milk depending on the size of the family. The bottles were well sealed

with a silver lining. They would in return the following day to collect the empty bottles in order to refill them ready for delivery. That is the Kisumu we want.

Mr. Speaker that is the Kisumu we want. I therefore stand strong to support the Governor and the County Government of Kisumu under the umbrella of ODM to make sure that this Kachok dumpsite is done with once and for all.

Mr. Speaker, when you enter Singapore, at the airport you are told that it is illegal to be in possession of chewing gum. In fact chewing of gums is not allowed in that Country because they are aware of the fact that once you are done with the chewing you will stick the gum anywhere. There is a very big penalty given to those who are found chewing. Look at our city, see how bad it looks like. I am aware that this matter is in court and let us see how good we can come out of it. If you are true Kisumian, let us give space to our County Government to make sure there is cleanliness.

Another issue, I would like to talk about is that let us not have the estate..... that is one challenge we are facing because of the tug of war in the waste management. Let us know what is in the waste management issue, if there is something they are getting then it should be in the decision of the common mwanainchi of Kisumu not an individual. The other day Singapore made excess money from the income and they are going to reward its residents with a token of appreciation. This is what we are looking forward to.

Look at the situation we are in. We have vest interest in this issue of Solid Waste Management. We want to control it, make money from it at the expense of mwanainchi who will intern suffer from diseases that emanate.

Finally, Mr. Speaker before I sit, I would like to request the mover of the motion that she has good intention and we thank you very much but please make sure we inter change in small towns like Ahero, Sondu, Muhoroni etc and let us know how best you will handle issues of waste management to ensure we don't have such an issue like we had in Kisumu. Thank you Mr. Speaker.

Temporary Speaker Hon. Agolla: Yes Hon. Priscah

Hon. Misachi: On appoint of order, I would like to support this motion with the following reasons: All Members of this County, representatives of all the wards, I want to assure you that solid waste will be handled not on the surface but on the ground but it must be within a ward, within a sub county, within a constituency. Why do I say that? I have known how Municipal and the County has struggled to get a place for solid waste. I want to assure you that we have to visit places to see how this menace is managed in other Countries.

We have been to Israel, Dar-es-salaam, Kisii and Kampala. What we want to do in our new solid waste management is to do a land fill and the land fill is not dumping and as members I want you to be in the fore front so that we can sensitize those who are claiming that we are transferring Kachock to another place. It is not the Kachock we are transferring to any sub county or to any ward but we want to make a Land fill. In a land fill, for example if you go to Kampala, the people who leave near the Karamajong, were earning salary, they sell the manure, the place is well kept and neat and you can even eat at the land fill without getting any foul smell.

Before we are tested and we agree as members of this House, because it is the members, who I can give as a practical example, We went and identified a place in West Kisumu measuring about 10 hectors as the Mayor of Kisumu then, I was accompanied by other Councilors because we wanted to negotiate for the piece of land and eventually pay. We were stoned by the residents, including the Councilors whom we went with.

I therefore want to urge the members of this Assembly that this is a very good motion. The act is there but are you going to stand firm and sensitize the people of the benefits to be enjoyed with the coming of the land fill. Let us understand what we want to do and where we want to take it. I am aware in the past that a land was purchased either in Muhoroni or Kibigori, but the people of the area refused to accept the idea claiming that they did not want Kachok to be taken to their area. And these sentiments were coming from the Members. I want to tell the members that this is a very good motion, but if we are not careful and if we have not been taken through what we want to do, I would like the CEC Environment to come and train members and also have seminars with the members in order to convince them that they are not transferring a damp site to their area. We should build a land fill which is well taken care of and well managed. I support.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Agolla): Yes Hon. Steve Owiti, Member for East Kolwa.

Hon Steve: Thank you Mr. Speaker, I stand to support this motion. When we talk about solid waste management, we realize that the huge mountain of garbage which has been standing for many years in Kachok has been a big problem.

Having grown up in Kisumu, the Kachok dumpsite was not a menace then, as we would go to the dumpsite as young people to collect used tyres for playing. But today if one visits the dumpsite then the smell that greets you is horrible. I think the mover of this motion has seen it wise and I agree with him it is just that what we are doing is a short term mitigation.

As we evacuate the dumpsite from Kachok to whatever place, we are seeing new waste being generated in this town each and every day being transported to that dumpsite. The rate at which we are transporting fresh waste to that site if no proper arrangement is made am quite sure that eventually we will have nothing. If the CEC environment and his team do not look at this matter

keenly, I have witnessed vehicles downloading refuse at Kachok which we are struggling to clean up. The County Government of Kisumu and in particular the environment should tell us the designated site for dumping our waste.

We know that the population growth in this town has really gone up. The CEC environment should come up and give a policy statement in regards to what the ministry tends to do with the new waste and what it intends to do with the solid waste otherwise if this factors is looked into well, they will lead to wasted funds. Otherwise Mr. Speaker, I support this matter and request the CEC environment to move with speed.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Agolla): Yes Hon. Seth from Seme

Hon. Okumu: Thank you Hon. Speaker, I want to commend the Majority Leader. As I mentioned yesterday, that the Public Health Act Cap 242 tasks the County Government to remove any nuisance, that can cause danger to its citizens.

The current way we are managing waste is questionable. In this House we have an implementation Committee which is tasked with these issues. They should ensure that once such laws are passed they should be implemented everywhere within the County. If we do not manage solid waste well, we have a lot of contamination on our surfaces including water. If we are not careful very soon we will have fire outbreaks in places where we dispose waste due to gasses that are not properly disposed of.

Sometime last year, there was an outbreak of bedbugs in Kisumu. This can be attributed to poor management of waste. Some countries like Madagascar and England have had outbreaks of plague in the past. If we do not manage our solid waste we will be invaded by rodents and insects. I support the motion and would like to urge the implementation Committee to make sure that as they follow up with the Executive on implementation, they should focus on Reduce, Reuse and Recycle of waste. They should focus on sensitizing the people. This should include the solid waste collectors which should be identified and licensed.

Hon. Member of Shauri-moyo has mentioned Land Reclamation which we should be sensitized on. This is a very noble idea. As I sit down, I think we should advocate for the separation of waste Mr. Speaker for easy management of waste. I support the motion.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Agolla): Yes Hon. Linet

Hon. Linet: Thank you Mr. Speaker, I stand to support the motion. Waste will ever be there in our lives. The waste in Kachok was producing bad smell that made a lot of people get sick. If we manage waste well we can have various uses for them eg Manure, and also get jobs for our youths.

One of us Members mentioned Kibigori site. We were very happy when we were told that the dump site was being brought here. I would request that we consider protecting River Awach and River Nyando, Most companies pour their waste in this water, I thank the mover of the motion because he has looked into the health of our people. I support the motion. Thank you.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Agolla): Yes Hon. Olale

Hon. Olale: Thank you Mr. Speaker, I stand to support the motion but require a lot of sensitization for environment committee and the implementing team at the Executive. The solid waste management should start from the House hold. Hon. Khan has talked about the defunct Municipal Council of Kisumu but I feel that wastes should be separated or sorted and not dumped together.

When all the waste from the other sub counties are collected and dumped in Kisumu, we receive an average of 100 tones being dumped in Kachok. Each and every sub county should have its waste managed at the Sub county level.

I support the motion thank you Mr. Speaker.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Agolla): Yes Hon. Olwal

Hon. Olwal: Thank you Mr. Speaker; this is a very good motion. I grew up in Kisumu not far away from the Kachok dumpsite. In my youth we fed on bread and other things that were dumped at Kachok because they were edible then. Most of the less fortunate also collected food from the dump site.

Most of us have debated well on this motion and it has come out clearly that waste has some benefits in it. Right now we have computers that are made out of very variable minerals. Our County should come clearly with policies on waste management especially the issue of recycling.

Our County should look at garbage as a source of income and not only as waste and not reject the waste sites if brought to their wards. I would be very delighted if a waste collection site is brought to my ward because I know the value of waste. I would urge the county to adopt new technology in the disposal of waste. I would also like the County to embrace modern technology in the disposal of waste. I happen to be the chair of planning which deals with urbanization and one of the key areas of urbanization is the identification of our County. I have travelled a lot and seen developed countries embracing technology even to the point of installing GPS systems on trucks and dustbins. So, it is very important that we embrace the use of technology when we are going to manage our waste. Otherwise, I do support the motion fully.

Temporary Speaker (Hon. Agolla): Yes Hon. Samo.

Hon. Samo: I want to thank you Mr. Speaker for guiding this House appropriately and I would like to pray for your wisdom in looking into this motion that is giving me fear as a person who comes from Kajulu Ward where land reform is taking place. The volume of this motion reads; aware that the current re-allocation of the Kachok dumpsite to Kajulu quarries is a short term measure that will only address the current eyesore situation along the highway. If the people of Kajulu could only here that, then I can assure you that I will never be in this House again because the Governor and the Senator are not really going to re-allocate the dumpsite to Kajulu as explained by Hon. Misachi and stand to refill of land reforms but they are going to concentrate on the dumpsite which is at Kachok and that is what the Kajulu people are aware of. The Senator and the City Manager has already come and explained the matter to the people of Kajulu. I want to support this motion that we request the CEC for environment to give a policy statement on this as it is put. We are becoming fearful as a community but after all this has been completed in Kajulu, what will they do with the fresh waste which is being deposited there. This motion is very good because after the CEC has come and explained to us, we will know as the people and report to the people of Kajulu that after the waste is dumped there then the fresh wastes will not be deposited in Kajulu because that is not the agreement that we made with the people of Kajulu.

We were also informed that there is a land that has been bought in Chiga area where they are going to put up some machines where all the wastes will be taken and sorted out and be used to distribute power and some other things. In the sequence of things it seems that things are going to be slaughtered politically. So, I just want you to help me Mr. Speaker because, my political opponents whenever they do come to Kajulu say that I have delivered a project worth Ksh.100,000,000. We are fearful that after that has happened this thing is going to be taken to Kajulu and we may never have anything to say. I support the motion and say that the CEC should come and give us a policy statement and I will use that to explain to the people of Kajulu.

Temporary Speaker (Hon. Agolla): Yes Hon. Hon. Elisha.

Hon. Elisha: I stand to support this motion. If Solid Waste Management is not taken seriously it can be a menace to a region. As you are aware of the Environmental Management Act 2012, it provides that it is the right for each and every person to be in a safe environment. Aware that solid waste management is a devolved function, we need to come serious on this matter. We are aware that recently several attempts have been done in recruiting people on contract in cleaning the markets which only last for a few days. To me that is not sustainable. There must be a strategic way on how to manage waste. If you walk around Kisumu County and to be specific Kisumu Town, there are bins that have been provided for people to put their waste and then they are picked and taken to a central place. You still wonder because when you are walking around, you find that people still drop the wastes on the ground.

If you ask my friend Hon. Olwal, there is something called spatial distribution of waste; we need to ensure that the Executive develops the GIS program where they are able to know the area of dumping the waste, the way they are collected and to follow up on the people who are working on the collection of waste to the central point. For me, this is even too late in that, we have been in the Government for the past 6 months. If we cannot see a tangible strategy and policy on how to manage the solid waste, then, I think that somebody should be brought in front to answer to the questions. When I hear of my friend talking about the re-allocating of the solid waste in Kajulu, I do sympathize with him. More than 10 tons of wastes are generated every day in Kisumu County and we ask ourselves how this waste is going to be managed? So, we cannot pretend to be moving the Kachok dumpsite to Kajulu which is not even a short term measure but an immediate measure because a short term measure will go for up to 5 years and we want something that goes on forever.

Temporary Speaker (Hon. Agolla): Yes Hon. Kanga.

Hon. Kanga: This motion should be treated with the content that it deserves. If you look at this County Government Act 2012, which was enacted by the previous County Assembly; This Act encompasses so much that the motion addresses just the part of it. This Act addresses the removal and disposal, Monthly Street cleaning which is not happening in Kisumu, removal of dead animals, public sanitation, toxic and hazard substances and recycling. The Act is talking about the long term solutions. We need to review this Act because in the last part of it which talks about transition. The final part of this Act is very selective because you are aware that, in the previous Government they acquired land at approximately 40 million somewhere in Kibigori. Why am I saying that this motion should be treated very carefully? Because the Majority Leader who comes from Muhoroni is talking about the re-allocation of the Kachok dumpsite and the money was previously used but he is not indicating that 40 million was used to buy land somewhere. He should have indicated that dumpsite to be re-allocated to where it was supposed to be.

Temporary Speaker (Hon. Agolla): What is it Hon. Olima.

Chief Whip (Hon. Olima): Is Hon. Kanga in order to drag the Leader of Majority into the purchase of a land which he did not know about because he was not a Member of this House? The Motion on the floor is also about a policy not acquisition or implementation.

Temporary Speaker (Hon. Agolla): What is it Hon. Pamela Odhiambo.

Deputy Leader of Majority (Hon. Pamela Odhiambo): I want to inform the Member that the motion on the floor is about the long-term Solid Waste Management policy for Kisumu County. The land was long bought and it is in this motion that we are going to know how to utilize the land that was bought.

Temporary Speaker (Hon. Agolla): What is it Hon. Muga.

Hon. Muga: I just want to know because it came out during the statement where the Member who was on his feet wanted to know how much money was used to purchase the land in Kibigori and now he is telling us what he knows about it. What was he trying to tell the House? Was it a way of misleading the House of what he knows?

Temporary Speaker (Hon. Agolla): Yes Hon. Kanga.

Hon. Kanga: As much as I respect your chair, I want to inform you that this is a House of Rules and Procedures. The three Members who have just stood on a point of order did not quote the standing order in which they were standing. There are things that I will not answer because this is a House of rules and procedures which they have not followed.

Temporary Speaker (Hon. Agolla): What is it Hon. Olima?

Hon. Olima: I said that I stood on standing order no. 82 part (1) which states that;

- '1) Any Member may raise a point of order at any time during the speech of another Member stating that the Member rises on a point of order and that Member shall be required to indicate the Standing Order upon which the point of order is based.'*

Hon. Kanga: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I want to continue by saying; however we are talking about the Kachok dumpsite which will address the management of solid waste management in Kisumu city, we have upcoming towns within Kisumu County where the solid waste management has not been addressed. These towns are; Ahero, Chemelil, Koru, Maseno and Muhoroni town and some Members are coming from Muhoroni and really talking about the Kachok dumpsite while they are not addressing the issues back in their own constituencies or wards.

Temporary Speaker (Hon. Agolla): What is it Hon. Genga?

Hon. Genga: The Honorable Member is making serious allegations and he should either withdraw or substantiate and make the facts known to this House; who are these Members that he hears come from Muhoroni? Can he say what he knows about the dumping site?

Temporary Speaker (Hon. Agolla): Hon. Kanga the floor is yours.

Hon. Kanga: Standing order no. 81 part (1) says that you have to rise on a point of order. This is a House of rules and procedures.

Temporary Speaker (Hon. Agolla): Hon. Kanga, if you clearly had Hon. Genga, he stood on a point of information and that is the reason as to why I was relaxed. What is it Hon. Ngeta?
