The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Madam Clerk could you please take us through the Order of the day?

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Next order!!

COMMUNICATION FROM THE CHAIR

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Thank you Hon. Members and welcome to this afternoon session. I am aware that we are slated to discuss one motion and I believe that we are going to dispense with it as fast as possible. Thank you.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Next order!!

PAPERS LAID

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Yes Hon. Miruka.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): What is it Hon. Muga?

Hon. Muga: Thank you Mr. Speaker. I just want to consult.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Who do you want to consult?

Hon. Muga: Thank you Mr. Speaker. I am being informed that you are still under papers.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Order!! Order!! Hon. Member.

Hon. Muga: It is okay.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): What is okay Hon. Member?

Hon. Muga: Mr. Speaker, I was brought a Statement to read but we have not reached that segment. Since I have been informed that the author of the document is in the House then, I would like to request the Serjeant-at-Arms to pass this document over to him.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Hon. Members, we are still under papers. If Hon. Miruka is in the House, there is a paper that he is expected to lay?

Hon. Miruka: Thank you Mr. Speaker. Pursuant to the provisions of County Assembly of Kisumu Standing Orders, I wish to table before this House today Tuesday, 16th March, 2021 a report from the Standing Committee of Labour and Social Welfare Committee on a Benchmarking Exercise with the sister County Assembly of Nyandarua. Thank you.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Hon. Miruka, I am yet to see that paper that you laid?

Hon. Miruka: Sorry Mr. Speaker, let me withdraw...

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Order!! Order!! Hon. Member. What are you withdrawing?

(Loud consultations)

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Order!! Order!! Hon. Members.

Hon. Miruka: Mr. Speaker, excuse me.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Order!! Hon. Member. Hon. Miruka, you have laid a paper before this House which you have forwarded to my table and this is not a House of giving excuses, this is a House of Order. So, Hon. Member, we will not allow you to give excuses in this House.

Hon. Miruka: Point of Order!!

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Order!! Hon. Miruka. Please resume your seat. Hon. Member, you requested that you be given a slot to lay a paper before this House. One, you came

in late. Two, even after laying the paper and forwarded it to the desk of the Speaker, you are still giving excuses. So, I first request you to withdraw the excuses because this is a House of orders not excuses.

Hon. Miruka: Thank you Mr. Speaker. Please allow me to withdraw because I ought to have adhered to the sequence of business it's when the Notice of Motion would follow later.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Hon. Miruka, we are still on papers and you are expected to lay a paper. I want to believe that you have laid a paper and that is the paper before me?

Hon. Miruka: Mr. Speaker, that is okay.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Thank you Hon. Member. I wish to acknowledge receipt of a Paper from the Standing Committee of Labour and Social Welfare Committee on a Benchmarking Exercise with the sister County Assembly of Nyandarua. I wish to direct that House Business Committee to consider scheduling this report for debate. Thank you.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Next order!!

NOTICE OF MOTION.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Yes, Hon. Miruka.

Hon. Miruka: Thank you Mr. Speaker. Pursuant to the provisions of County Assembly of Kisumu Standing Order 45, I wish to give a Notice of Motion on a Report from the Standing Committee of Labour and Social Welfare Committee on a Benchmarking Exercise with the sister County Assembly of Nyandarua. Thank you.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Next order!!

STATEMENTS

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Yes, Hon. Arao, Acting Leader of Majority.

Acting Leader of Majority (Hon. Arao): Thank you Mr. Speaker. I want to appreciate you for according me this chance. First, allow me to congratulate...

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Order!! Order!! Hon. Member.

Acting Leader of Majority (Hon. Arao): Mr. Speaker, I want to give a Personal Statement...

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Under which Standing Orders?

Acting Leader of Majority (Hon. Arao): Mr. Speaker, Standing Order No. 42.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Thank you. Please proceed.

Acting Leader of Majority (Hon. Arao): Thank you Mr. Speaker. Foremost, please allow me to congratulate the following Hon. Members. Hon. Ojuok, Hon. Olale and finally myself. Mr. Speaker, these are Members from Nyakach who their wives have given birth. Personally my wife has been blessed to have twins.

Mr. Speaker, the reason that I rose to give a statement is to request this Hon. House to allow Paternity Leave to be accorded to these Members who their wives have given birth. This will allow us to arrange and equally plan on how we can welcome to this world these babies and cater for their future so that they do not miss their parental warmth at this time which they require the most. Mr. Speaker, it is within your discretion to decide because this is captured in the relevant Acts of parliament that we are supposed to be accorded two weeks Paternity Leave, but, because I know Standing Order No. 1 accords you more powers, you can decide what befits these Members of the Assembly and if you could accord as fourteen days I will really appreciate.

Finally, these are new voters who are going to enjoy the fruits of BBI. Thank you.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Thank you Hon. Members. We wish to join you in congratulating the other Hon. Members as you are aware that under Standing Orders No. 42 Personal Statements may not be discussed. Hon. Member, from my Chair, I will not open them up for discussions. It is true that you are supposed to be accorded Paternity Leave and it is a requirement by law and under Standing Order No. 1, I cannot provide otherwise because the law stipulates clearly that your employer should accord you 14 days Paternity Leave. This is upon application. So, it is your right to apply so that you get the 14 days. Thank you.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): What is it Hon. Guya?

Hon. Guya: Thank you Mr. Speaker. I am rising on Standing Orders No. 41 (2) (b) which states that a Member may request for a statement from the Committee Chairperson relating to matters under the mandate of the House Committee and the Speaker may appoint a day for the Statement to be made or direct that it be responded to the same day.

Mr. Speaker, I had sought for a statement from the Chairperson, Education Committee concerning the issues to do with Bursaries and Scholarships for our students. This Statement was supposed to be responded to last week. Unfortunately, by then the Chairperson of Education Committee was not in the House. Mr. Speaker, given that your chair instructed that it be responded to in a fortnight even though the Chair requested that it be responded to in one week, but the Speaker gave an extension for one more week. Mr. Speaker, now that the Chair of Education Committee is here could we kindly get responses on what is happening on issues to do with Bursaries and Scholarships within this County. Thank you.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Thank you Hon. Member. I totally agree with your Statement but it is the prerogative of the House Business Committee to schedule what is supposed to be discussed in the floor of this House. Looking at the Order Paper of today, under Statements or motions, I don't see time slotted for the Chair of Education Committee to give his Statement of response towards the same. Order!! Order!! Hon. Members, I am giving a ruling on Hon. Guya's Statement...

Hon. Samo: Mr. Speaker, please before you give your ruling.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Order!! Hon. Member. Please let me first conclude with Hon. Guya then I will give you time...

Hon. Samo: Mr. Speaker, if you make your ruling before hearing me out, then, it will be out of context.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Hon. Member, please let me first conclude with the issue Hon. Guya has raised, I promise to give you a chance.

So, under Statement was the Chair given a slot to respond? I have neither seen that in motions. Neither has the Chairperson requested under Standing Orders No. 42 (2) (d) where he should have made a formal request to be accorded time to respond because he just talked on issues of personal capacity under Standing Orders No. 42. Hon. Member, in that regard, it will be biased of me to ask him to give a response if time slotted to him has not been matured.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): What is it Hon. Guya, I believe that I have made a ruling on your Statement and I want to give Hon. Samo.

Hon. Guya: On a Point of Order. Mr. Speaker, I believe that you are just giving an opinion. Mr. Speaker, this is a House of Rules and Procedures and the same procedures requires that, once the Speaker has directed that the Statement sought be brought to the House, then that must be honoured.

Mr. Speaker, we have had statements in this House and Hon. Members responding to them even those not slotted in the Order Paper. Mr. Speaker, Members have always requested for Statements and respective Chairpersons have always responded to them on the same day without allocating them time slots by the House Business Committee. I know that I requested for the Statement but I am sure that, the Statement that I sought is affecting the County in its entirety that includes the Ward that you represent. Given that you had directed, I am not aware that the Speaker's directive don't apply to this House even after you had directed that the Statement be brought last week and I was just directing because, it is as if your directives ceased working in this House, and if at all it works then, it might be interpreted differently.

Mr. Speaker, if it is the same person seated there which is you that directed that it be brought last week and today again you are stating that the Statement is not ready because it has not been accorded a slot by the House Business Committee even though the Chair for Education Committee had requested for one week and we are in the third week and the Statement has not been responded to.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Thank you Hon. Member, I believe your point is taken and that you want the Statement responded to in this House. The Chair of Education is here and he would have requested under Standing Orders No. 41 (2) (d) to be given time to reply. I know it is evident that we cannot compel him to reply because he does not have it with him. Hon. Member, we cannot bleed him to bring a response from nowhere...

Hon. Guya: Mr. Speaker, I don't believe that is right. You have the powers to compel a Member to bring a report to this House and today you are creating a precedence that we will follow moving forward that when a Statement is sought here, I will not be compelled to reply to the Statement which becomes the property of the House.

Hon. Samo: Mr. Speaker, Point of Information?

The temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): What is it Hon. Roy Samo?

Hon. Samo: (*On a point of information*) Mr. Speaker, two aspects are coming out quite clearly. First, is that you have to declare your interest on the matter. As the Speaker and the powers given to you by the virtue of the seat, you aren't allowed to contribute in parliamentary debates as it is the parliamentary norm. What I mean in this case is the fact that despite the Honorable Chairperson in question being in the House, you are ruling for him yet he's sitting comfortably, which only implies that he lacks the response sought from him.

Secondly, as the Honorable Speaker chaired the debate last week on Wednesday 10th March, 2021, he made a ruling that when a Statement has been brought to the House, it is not a must that the case be forwarded to the committee for the matter to be debated upon and agreed on. He further said that the matter can as well be dealt with in case the Chairperson of the House Committee involved is present in the House. As it is applied in Commonwealth House of Commons, I beseech you to sometimes give us leeway to getting answers from the Chairperson or their Vice-chairs in House.

The temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Thank you Hon. Samo. Yes, Hon. Philemon Ojuok.

Hon. Ojuok: Thank you Mr. Speaker, I would just want to point out that it would be quite an unpleasant precedence for this House. It is the House that directed for the issue to be brought back in two weeks' time but, it is now long overdue. For the Chairperson of the Committee of ECD, Adult Education and Vocational Training to sit there and blatantly say that there is no response is quite unfortunate and casual. The Committee is already in drains and this makes it even worse.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Thank you Hon. Ojuok. What is it Hon. David Arao? Do you want to contribute on the same?

Hon. Arao: Thank you Mr. Speaker. I understand the predicament of the Members and would want to say that we have been giving Progressive Reports on the statement that was given by Hon. Johnson Guya. The last time we spoke to the Executive, we did a letter, which they responded to. However, going through the response, it was not comprehensive because it never tackled the issues sought for by my committee as well as the entire House. Therefore, we communicated back seeking for a comprehensive report, which could enable me to present to members. That is the current status of the response to the statement earlier raised by Hon. Guya as we still wait for the comprehensive report from the Executive, thank you.

Hon. Genga: Point of information Mr. Speaker.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Who do you want to inform?

Hon. Genga: Mr. Speaker, I want to inform the House regarding the Statement made by Hon. Guya.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Proceed.

Hon. Genga: (*On a point of information*). This is quite serious a matter and I want to guide the Honorable Chair for ECD, Adult Education and Vocational Training.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Order! Honorable Member, you stood to inform the House and not the Honorable Chairperson.

Hon. Genga: Mr. Speaker, with the same authority that you are provided as the Speaker under Standing Order No. 1, you are also not allowed to gag members during their contribution. If I say that I want to inform the Chairperson of the House Committee in question, it is because he should have given us a Progress Report but, he talks as though he works for the Executive. We have been having issues with the Chairperson, Hon. Arao, on the Bursary issue as he glosses over it. I want to inform him that he works for the Assembly and the residents of Kisumu and that this is a matter of Topical Concern for the Assembly. Where is that progress report? Why are there still questions on the issue of Bursary? He should come clean on that.

The temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Thank you Honorable Members...

Hon. Guya: Point of order Mr. Speaker.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Denied, I want to first finish the issue with the statement by Hon. Arao.

Hon. Guya: A point of order Mr. Speaker. It is in line with the same.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Order!! Hon. Guya, kindly resume your seat.

Hon. Atieno: Mr. Speaker, please do not gag the House.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Order! Hon. Atieno, resume your seat.

(Loud consultations)

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Order!! Honorable Members. It is not a matter of how many points of order reached out for but a matter of procedures that can help us scrutinize what the Chair of the Committee on ECD, Adult Education and Vocational Training has or hasn't brought before the House. Let us follow the procedures of bringing issues before the House to help us move effectively by addressing those that the committee left out. That's why I advised the House Business Committee to slot for Hon. Arao for his submission.

(Loud consultations)

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Order!! Honorable Members. I insist that we cannot discuss a statement that Hon. Arao has not presented before the House. If you want Hon. Arao to be held accountable then, there is a provision for another Member to raise a statement for that claim. On that note; this is the chair's submission on Hon. Arao's statement; I want to ask Hon. Arao to bring a reply of the statement that was sought by Hon. Guya. Further, I want to request the House Business Committee to slot for you time tomorrow because of the nature of anger witnessed by members in this House on the issue of bursary. We want that matter discussed tomorrow once and for all.

Leader of Minority (Hon. Oiko): Point of order Mr. Speaker.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): What is your point of order Hon. Pete Oiko?

Leader of Minority (Hon. Oiko): Mr. Speaker, your ruling is quite good and you have further requested the House Business Committee to slot Hon. Arao for tomorrow and yet the House Business Committee met today, Tuesday, 16th March, 2021. When are they going to meet if tomorrow afternoon will be on a Wednesday?

Hon. Ogaga: Mr. Speaker, please protect me from Hon. Arao.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Order!! Hon. Arao.

Hon. Ogaga: Mr. Speaker, kindly protect me from him because the Minister for Education is delaying and now, he is threatening my life because I am speaking the truth about the Status of the Bursaries...

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Order! Honorable Members. Sergeant-at-arms can you please assist the honorable members.

Hon. Ogaga: (To Hon. Arao): Why are you luring me with money yet the children are suffering?

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Yes, Leader of Minority, could you please finish your submissions?

Hon. Guya: Mr. Speaker, could you please protect Hon. Judith Ogaga from harassment by Hon. Arao.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Hon. Arao Order!

Leader of Minority (Hon. Oiko): Mr. Speaker, the matter is of great concern to the Members of the Assembly and in normal practice, you could have just let members air their views without making the kind of ruling you have made is frankly not taking the House anywhere. Consequently, the House Business Committee cannot meet tomorrow as it will be a Wednesday.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Thank you Hon. Leader of Minority. I want to say that nothing in our Standing Orders stops the House Business Committee from meeting and slotting time for debate after this plenary. This then allows Hon. Arao to give us a report worthy of discussion in this House, and as I see it, you will be discussing a null report because it is not here yet. Hon. Members want me to open a debate over a report that is not there, and that is not possible. As I have directed, therein; if he fails to deliver tomorrow then the House will decide on which course to take regarding that, thank you honorable members.

Hon. Guya: Point of order Mr. Speaker.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): What is your point of order Hon. Guya?

Hon. Guya: Mr. Speaker, is it in order for Hon. Arao to say to this House that he brought a progress report on the same yet nobody in this House including me who sought for that statement hasn't seen that progress report? Who does he reply to in case there is a progress report?

Secondly, despite you directing that the progress report be brought to the House tomorrow through the HBC, yet he is claiming that the response is still not there, and as you have supported him on the same, what then will he be bringing tomorrow? Mr. Speaker, let us not tolerate such mediocrity in this House.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Thank you Hon. Guya...

Hon. Guya: Mr. Speaker, I was on a point of order, please allow me to summarize. This is an issue of Topical Concern and I am currently even receiving text messages of students who were sent home from school because of school fees and schools are almost closing yet nothing has been paid for the children that are to benefit from the Bursaries. He is busy telling us how he has been blessed with twins. What has the twins have to do with the issues of Bursaries? Thank you.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Hon. Guya, Honorable Members are allowed to bring statements under Standing Order No. 42, which are Personal in nature. Nothing denies Hon. Arao from doing the same. Nevertheless, I remember you asking me to give a statement regarding your sought statement and clearly whatever he brought forth today is not worth discussing in the House today, this is the Speaker's decision that, the statement be brought tomorrow in the afternoon. Thank you, honorable members.

Hon. Ngeta: Mr. Speaker, this matter is being handled casually yet our children are really suffering...

The temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Order! Hon. Ngeta.

Hon. Olwal: Point of information Mr. Speaker.

The temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Who do you want to inform Hon. Olwal?

Hon. Olwal: I want to inform the House Mr. Speaker.

The temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Please make it brief Hon. Olwal.

Hon. Olwal: Mr. Speaker, I believe that we are honorable Members and this is a House of Rules and Procedures but the precedence you have set today will put this House to jeopardy. As one of the Chairperson to a House Committee, I have a responsibility to statements by members and if so, the same Standing Order that you have quoted...

The temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Order! Hon. Olwal, I have directed that the statement be brought to the House tomorrow...

Hon. Olwal: I want to guide you that as the Speaker...

(The Temporary Speaker rises on his feet)

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Hon. Atieno, resume your seat. Hon. Member, resume your seat. Hon. Members, we are on statements and you know that it is easy for the Speaker to move us to the next order. But, I do not want to do that. That is why I am giving you time. However, you are not making it easy.

(Loud consultations)

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Order Hon. Members! Order Hon. Arao! Order Hon. Members! We cannot come to this House to discuss opinions. Order!! Hon. Members, I know that you would prefer that Hon. Arao gives you...

(Hon. Members consulting loudly)

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Order Hon. Members. Sergeant-at-arm, could you please escort Hon. Arao outside the House? Let him get out of the House.

(Loud consultations)

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Thank you Hon. Members. I know the challenges that we are all facing and I know how painful it is when it comes to the issue of Bursaries. It is painful too plus how the Chairperson ECD Adult Education and Vocational Training Committee is casually handling the issue.

We cannot therefore take it as casual as he wants, that is why I have directed that he brings the statement tomorrow afternoon, so, that Members can have information...

Hon. Olwal: Point of information.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Order Hon. Olwal!.

Hon. Olwal: Mr. Speaker, there is a provision of taking matters to Ad Hoc Committee or to the Committee of the Whole House...

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Order!! Hon. Olwal. Hon. Olwal, if you want us to discuss issues here like we do at home, then I believe that this House will not be as Honourable as it should be. Hon. Members, I have directed and for the last time I am again informing the House that in the matter of Bursaries as was requested by Hon. Guya we shall get a statement of reply tomorrow in the afternoon. We have also directed the Chairperson so I want the matter to be settled as it is right now, thank you hon. Members.

Hon. Ogaga: Mr. Speaker, it is Bursaries and Scholarships.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Thank you Hon. Member for your guidance.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Yes Hon. Muga.

Hon. Muga: Thank you very much Mr. Speaker sir. I just wanted to inform the House that for a report to be brought to here, the Chairperson of that House Committee must go and prepare that report first and then request for a slot by the House Business Committee. Therefore I fail to understand if you are directing the House Business Committee to go and sit; you would have directed the Chairperson to go and make a clear report and then request for a date for bringing that report to the House sir.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Thank you Hon. Member, Hon. Members we are on statement time.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Yes Hon. Genga.

Hon. Genga: Thank you Chair. With all the due respect and pursuant to the provisions of Standing Order No. 1 which gives you the authority, I am kindly seeking for your guidance. You have admitted before this Honourable House that the Chairperson of Education Committee glosses and is reluctant over the matter that you have directed that he gives a statement or a reply. So, Hon. Chair, I do not know because if you yourself has admitted, I am now asking that, why don't you refer this matter to a Committee of the Whole House? Because, this is a matter of County concern.

(Applause)

The manner in which you give direction in this matter means that the Hon. Chair is let out the hook. Because the House Business Committee has to meet first, then give him a slot for tomorrow in the afternoon. How I wish that, through the authority that you have and also as provided for under Standing Order No 1. Mr. Chair, kindly refer the matter concerning the Bursaries and Scholarships to the Committee of the Whole House for ventilation and debate the matter then you can give an informed ruling.

(Applause)

Mr. Speaker, just as I reiterated that you yourself have admitted that the Chairperson ECD Adult Education and Vocational Training Committee is not serious with his docket. It is a matter that is in public domain. So, I am kindly asking for your guidance that since you have made a ruling but you still have the powers to make another ruling so that we move forward on this issue, thank you.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Thank you Hon. Member. I understand your point but, I want to request as we leave it that we wait until tomorrow for him to bring a statement or reply. If that is not possible, it is then that we will go what you are requesting. Hon. Member we are on statement and I am seeing Hon...

Hon. Olima: Thank you Hon. Speaker...

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Hon. Olima, don't you even allow the Speaker to notice you before you even start talking? I know that you have a burning point, anyway, proceed Hon. Member.

Hon. Olima: Thank you Mr. Speaker. As a member of ECD Adult Education and Vocational Training Committee...

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): We are on Statements.

Hon. Gard: Yes, that is where I am...

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Hon. Member, under which Standing Order are you on?

Hon. Olima. Standing Order No. 42. Thank you Mr. Speaker, I wanted to give very important information on the same. THAT as a member of that committee, I have seen my chairperson being thrown out and Mr. Speaker I do not know where you want him to get the statement to bring to you. Because, between now and tomorrow afternoon, we do not have sittings, meetings and any document to put a signature on.

Therefore, by directing that by tomorrow the statement should be ready; from who and how? Mr. Speaker I believe that this matter concerning Bursaries and Scholarships is very crucial to the County. In fact by now we should be doing allocation for the next financial year that is FY 2021/2022...

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Order! Order Hon. Member. You stood under Standing Order No. 42, but I have allowed you to go ahead and talk about a matter that we had concluded on. However, let me inform you since you came in late, Hon. Arao was given time up to last week to give statement on this House, but, even today, when he stood on a statement, he did not. That is the reason as to why we are directing him that because the time has lapsed for him to bring a statement on reply, it is why we are giving him up to tomorrow afternoon to bring a statement of reply or we go by the resolution that the House will make tomorrow, thank you Hon. Member.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Yes, Hon. Pamela Odhiambo.

Hon. Pamela Odhiambo: Thank you Mr. Speaker, I am requesting that under Standing Order No. 1, you allow me to raise a very important issue in this House.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Order Hon. Member. Resume your seat; I want to guide you Hon. Member.

Hon. Pamela Odhiambo: It is a matter of urgency and I want to raise it under the Statement.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Under which Standing Order?

Hon. Pamela Odhiambo: Standing Order Nos. 1 and 42.

(Laughter).

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Order!! Hon. Member. Please resume your seat. I want to guide you.

Hon. Pamela Odhiambo: Mr. Speaker, I am occupying the seat of the Leader of Majority so, I hope that you understand.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): I understand Hon. Member. Please resume your seat. Hon. Members, I just wanted to inform you that, we are under statement on our Order Paper of today, and in those statements, we can only give statements under Standing Order Nos. 41 and 42,

Hon. Member. If you have statement that were supposed to be written, then it is Standing Order No. 41; 2 (a) and (b) and if you are the Chairperson of a House Committee, then you allowed to give it under Standing Order No. 41; 2 (d). So, proceed with those guidelines, thank you.

Hon. Pamela Odhiambo: Thank you Mr. Speaker. This goes to the Roads, Transport and Public Works Committee. Mr. Speaker, Kshs 20 million had been released for fuel and I want to know which wards that the fuel was used. Because that is a lot of money and if at all it was used, then nobody would be crying in this House. So, I am raising and requesting the Chairperson of that House Committee to bring a report that they used the fuel for murraming, Mr. Speaker.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Thank you Hon. Member of Manyatta “B” Ward. I get your statement but, under our Standing Order, it will be hard for me to even inform the Roads Committee to give a statement of reply on your statement. This is because, under our Standing Orders, No. 41: 2 (a) and (b) that if you wanted it, then you would have written in black and white and approved. We would then allow you to read it and send a copy to the relevant committee to go and discuss. So, I want to request you that tomorrow during statement time, you bring the statement to us in written format as stipulated in our Standing Order so that we can direct it to the Roads, Transport and Public Works Committee so that they give us reply within the stipulated time, thank you Hon. Member.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Yes Hon. Olwal.

Hon. Olwal: Thank you Mr. Speaker, I want to give Statement under Standing Order No. 41: 2 (d) as the Chairperson of Planning, Industrialization and ICT Committee.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Proceed Hon. Member.

Hon. Olwal: Thank you. Mr. Speaker, there are two Bills that were committed to my Committee and we went about conducting public participation. But, the time we were given to make a reply, we cannot manage because of the public participation which is still going on. So I am hereby requesting to be added two more weeks because of emotive nature of land issues, thank you.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Hon. Member, I believe that before you gazetted the public participation, you agreed as a committee on the schedule and forwarded it to the clerk. I believe that the Office of the Speaker will try to help you and communicate to you on the possibility of your request.

Hon. Guya, you had given a statement and you cannot give another statement after statement. So, I want to request that you save...

Hon. Guya: Mr. Speaker, I believe that, one is not in the Standing Orders.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Hon. Member allow me to refer you to the Standing Orders.

Hon. Guya: Mr. Speaker, a member is allowed to make even up to ten statements.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Hon. Member, but, today I will not allow you because in the Standing Orders does not say so.

Hon. Guya: Mr. Speaker, I just want to remind you of what had been sought here so that a further ruling on the same. A different statement not the one that we were discussing.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Hon. Guya, I want to remind you that when you are making a statement, make them continuous so that you break them. I believe that for today, I will not allow you to break the rules of the Standing Order. You have always...

Hon. Guya: Just allow me one minute, one minute please.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Hon. Guya, I will not allow you to have any more statements. I will push your statement to tomorrow. Any additional statement that you want to make since you have insisted that this House is a House of order and for that reason, we have sent out the Chairperson ECD Adult Education and Vocational Training Committee because we felt he was out of order. I will also not allow you to break the same orders that you believe that we need to follow. On that note, I request that your statement can only be slotted for tomorrow.

Hon. Guya: Mr. Speaker, I wanted to request that you give a directive on the statement can also be brought on a date that you can... just a reminder to the House.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Thank you, Hon. Guya.

Hon. Guya: Not a statement but a reminder that was sought.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): But we are on orders of statements Hon. Member. Please resume your seat. Thank you, Hon. Member.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Yes Hon. Samo.

Hon. Samo: Hon. Speaker, I think that that one is also out of order from your chair. Mr. Speaker, a person who is a member of this House.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Order!! Hon. Samo. We are on statement Hon. Member and please, give a statement while making reference to Standing Orders on Statements.

Hon. Samo: Mr. Speaker, but that is the same thing that I am talking about. Hon. Speaker, let us be factual on this matter.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Please we are on Statements.

Hon. Samo: If a member has even ten statements, she or he is allowed to seek for these statements.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Yeah, you are allowed.

Hon. Samo: Mr. Speaker on the same note, let me request for your patience. The hon. Member did raise a statement, but was interrupted by hon. Members because of the contribution. You understand its nature. However, on the same matter as a second statement by Law he is allowed to do the same. If you rule and yet we have a one hour statement period which starts from 3:00 pm, then it is within the law. So, if you expose this kind of law that we have in the House should be followed by both side sir.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): So, Hon. Samo, do you have statements to give today?

Hon. Samo: No, I was just guiding you so that you allow him to...

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Thank you Hon. Member. Hon. Guya I will give out his Statement tomorrow.

Hon. Guya: Point of order. It is not a statement Mr. Speaker. It is not a statement but a reminder.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Are you on a point of order?

Hon. Guya: Yes sir.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): What is your point of order?

Hon. Guya: Thank you, I am on a Point of Order No. 41 on Statements. I do not want to seek for a statement but I just want to remind you and the Whole House that there is another pending statement that I had sought for; which was supposed to be brought here last week. However, it has not been scheduled anywhere. That was just a reminder that I wanted to put across. I had sought a statement from the Chairperson of Implementation Committee on the Implementation Status of the Projects of the FY 2020/2021 and 2019/2020.

Mr. Speaker, the reason why I was reminding you is because over the weekend we were somewhere as the Committee of Budget and Appropriations and what we heard over there are things that if we don't take them seriously those projects might not be there because for example a whole Sub-county like Seme has generated Kshs 2 million over the past 8 months. So that is something that is very key; if we don't discuss the Implementation Status with the current revenues that we are collecting then, we might not even have those projects. Thank you.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Yes Hon. Otiang'.

Hon. Otiang': Thank you Mr. Speaker. I am rising on a Personal Statement basing on observation of the House. We are currently debating about the Education Department. There is a tendency by the departments of not honouring the House when we call them for these consultative meetings. They are not responsive to some of the problems that we are facing and when they are not

responsive then we do not get the answers that we require from them. I want to suggest if there is another avenue where we can do a very elaborate letter to the Executive that they should honour this House and bring all the necessary documents that we want so that we are not left behind with all the statements that are sought for in this House.

On the same note, I would like to ask the Members or which ever committee one is in that you make sure that when a statement is sought for in the House then, all the Members of that committee should be in the House to support the same because these are the same Members who sit but when the responses come then they don't even know. So I am really appealing that if there is any order that can be made by your office then it should come as a directive.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Thank you. What is it Hon. Beatrice Pamela?

Hon. Beatrice Pamela: Mr. Speaker I would like to inform the House that the Member who was contributing has forgotten her mandate because pursuant to the provisions of our Standing Orders we are given our mandate to seek information from the Executive, invite them if they don't issue us with the information and summon them if necessary. So if committees fail to do their work then they cannot come here and burden your Chair to give directions on an issue that we had already given powers to carry out. Thank you.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Thank you. I hope Hon. Otiang' stands guided. The role of the Speaker in the House is to guide debate and help them make decisions on the debate by using a simple majority as required by law. Hon. Otiang' you have all the powers to take action whenever a committee or a House has summoned, invited or requested a Member to give information with you work as a committee. I want to agree with Hon. Beatrice Pamela that it is not the responsibility of the Office of the Speaker to help you execute your legally laid down functions.

Hon. Otiang': Mr. Speaker with due respect, you have mentioned my name and I have to respond. Yes I stand guided but as a House, you urge members to take their responsibilities seriously and I believe that is something that can go by without us mentioning.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Thank you. Hon. Members I want us to finish on the statements because we have a motion ahead of us. Hon. Genga I believe that, you had issued your statement! Or do you want to sneak another statement like Hon. Guya?

Hon. Genga: Mr. Speaker I was seeking for guidance. Mr. Speaker I stand on personal statement...

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Seth Okumu): Order Hon. Member. I believe that we are almost at 1530 hours.

Hon. Genga: Mr. Speaker you are gagging me and as I stood up I said I was seeking your guidance which indeed you gave. I did not issue my personal statement.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Order Hon. Member. What is good for the goose is good for the gander. If you think that others should follow the orders of the House then you also agree to follow the orders of the House and that is why I am trying to help you so that you follow the orders of the House. So, I just want to request you that you just keep your statement because we are having an Assembly tomorrow in the morning where you can provide the statement.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Next Order!

MOTION

AGRICULTURE, LIVESTOCK AND FISHERIES REPORT ON THE STATEMENT RAISED
BY HON. ERICK AGOLA ABOUT THE MYSTERIOUS DEATHS OF NILE PERCH FISH
IN LAKE VICTORIA

BY HON. VITALIS OTURA – CHAIRPERSON

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Yes Hon. Otura.

PREAMBLE

Mr. Speaker and Hon. Members, during the assembly sitting on Tuesday, 9th February, 2021, Hon Eric Agolla, MCA for South West Kisumu Ward, sought for a statement pursuant to standing orders no. (41) Regarding mysterious deaths of Nile Perch Fish (*Lates niloticus*) in Lake Victoria (see annex 1).

The statement was consequently committed to the Sectoral Committee on Agriculture, Irrigation, Livestock and Fisheries to investigate, probe, inquire and report back the Findings and Recommendations to the House within a two weeks period.

LEGAL FRAMEWORK UNDERPINNING COMMITTEE ACTIVITIES

Mandate of the Committee

The Agriculture, Irrigation, Livestock and Fisheries Committee derives its mandate from Article 185 of the Constitution of Kenya 2010, read together with Standing Order No. 193 of the Kisumu County Assembly Standing Orders.

Standing Order Number 193 (Second Schedule) of the County Assembly of Kisumu further stipulates as follows.

That the Committee shall inquire into, investigate and report on;

All matters relating to agriculture, including crop and animal husbandry, livestock sale yards, County abattoirs, plant and animal disease control, veterinary services (excluding regulation of

the profession) and fisheries; animal control and welfare, including licensing of dogs and facilities for their accommodation, care and burial of animals.

Provision of County Assembly Standing Order No. 193(5)

1. The functions of Sectoral committees shall be;
 - a) Investigate, inquire into, and report on all matters relating to the mandate, management, activities, administration, operation and estimates of the assigned departments;
 - b) Study the programme and policy objectives of departments and policy objectives of departments and the effectiveness of the implementation;
 - c) Study and review all the County legislation referred to it;
 - d) Study, access and analyze the relative success of the departments as measures by the results obtained as compared with their stated objectives;
 - e) Investigate and inquire into all matters relating to the assigned departments as they may deem necessary, and as may be referred to them by the County Assembly;
 - f) To vet and report all appointments where the Constitution or any law requires the County Assembly to approve, except those under Standing Order No. 187 (Committee on Appointments).
 - g) Make reports and recommendations to the County Assembly as often as possible, including recommendation of proposed legislation.

Committee Sitting

Mr. Speaker and Hon Members, in order to accomplish the task that was entrusted to the Committee by the House regarding the Statement. The Committee urgently requested the House Business Committee to slot for it three Committee sittings to enable members deliberate on the statement, program for the investigations and generate this crucial report.

Through the deliberations, the Committee resolved to write to the line Department vide a letter REF: CAK/ALF/CG/VOL.XXVIII/2021 dated Monday, 22nd February, 2021 (see annex ii) to submit a detailed report to the Committee on the mysterious deaths of the Fish Species in L. Victoria.

The Committee also interrogated the statement and identified its key concerns which formed the basis of our investigations as indicated in the TOR embodied herein;

The Committee was guided by the following TOR;

- I. Inquiries on the peculiar death of Nile Perch Fish Species in Lake Victoria.
- II. KEFRI Findings on the Death of Nile Perch Fish Species.
- III. Measures put by National and County Government to curb the crisis.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

Mr. Speaker and Hon. Members, Fish Kill is an annual phenomenon that usually occurs on Lake Victoria and is associated with weather patterns. In 2020 Lake Victoria as well as the Riparian regions experienced severe weather patterns, a possible reason to higher extent of Fish Kills reported this time than the previous episodes.

Results from the wide Lake hydro-acoustic (conducted last year) indicate widespread thermal stratification patterns, most prominently in North Western, South Western and North Eastern sectors of the Lake.

During the Survey (hydro-acoustic) Dissolved oxygen profiles showed instances of anoxia or below critical levels of dissolved oxygen occurring at the bottom depth zones. Inquiries from Uganda report, significant fish kills observed on the Ugandan side of the lake in January 2021 was attributed to weathers patterns.

It is therefore most likely that the recent changes in weather conditions could have triggered mixing of the Lake, an event that could lead to fish kills.

Following numerous reports from Fishermen on mass fish kill in Lake Victoria, a team of scientist drawn from KEMFRI visited Busia and Siaya Counties on a fact finding mission (31/01/2021 and 01/02/2021).

Fishers' investigation depicted mass fish kills on the Kenyan side of the lake to have been observed during late January and February, 2021. The Preliminary water quality tests by KEMFRI pointed to low dissolved oxygen (anoxia) below critical levels.

COMMITTEE OBSERVATIONS AND FINDINGS

Mr. Speaker and Hon. Members, during our investigations on the matter, the Committee established that a team of scientist from KEMFRI had conducted some analysis on the status of Fish and water in Lake Victoria.

KEMFRI INVESTIGATIOS

The scientist visited Busia and Siaya Counties on a fact finding mission and collected samples of dead floating fish and water from (Ndekwe bay, Magera Island and Naya Bay) on 31/01/2021 and 01/02/2021 and are currently being analyzed.

Consequently, the physico-chemical data were also taken instantaneously and results of analysis were as indicated on the findings;

KEMFRI FINDINGS

1. It was observed that the phenomenal happened to one species and that is *Lates niloticus* (Mbuta/ Nile Perch.

2. The water quality tests portrayed anoxia condition that's low dissolved oxygen (on average about 3.5mg/L) below critical levels desired for fish survival. Reported data was collected during day time and it's believed to have been much lower at night.
3. The investigations have ruled out fish poisoning since only the Nile Perch Fish Species was affected by the phenomenon and the organoleptic test conducted likely depicted Fish muscles to be fresh soon after death.
4. Mass Fish Kills on the Kenyan side occurred during late January and early weeks of February, 2021

Mr. Speaker and Hon. Members, based on the response received from the Line Department (see annex iii) on this matter, the Committee made the following additional findings.

That;

1. It is suspected that adverse weather conditions on the Lake caused mixing of the different waters (stratified the Lake), thereby reducing oxygen levels in the Lake to undesirable levels for survival of the Nile Perch Species.
2. The Fish Kills have moved from Kenya to Tanzania.
3. There were no reported Fish Deaths in Kisumu.
4. The Directorate conducted a Radio Talk to sensitize the public on the same in the Month of February, 2021.

Recommendations

Mr. Speaker and Hon. Members, The Committee in consideration of its findings herein makes the following recommendations;

That:

- I. There is need for Lake wide sample collection (water, sediments & Fish) for thorough analysis to determine the absolute cause of the phenomenon.
- II. KEMFRI to expedite its comprehensive laboratory findings report on the samples collected which are currently under analysis.
- III. The County Executive to create extensive awareness to the public, Beach management Unit, Fishers and Fish traders on the phenomenon and encourage them to report such mysterious occurrences to the relevant authorities when noticed.
- IV. The Department to submit regulations on the County Fisheries and Aquaculture Act, 2019 to operationalize the law to provide for the sustainable utilization, development and management of Fisheries, Aquaculture and other aquatic resources.
- V. The County executive to work closely with the National Government and other stakeholders in the Lake to enhance speedy findings on the causes of the mass fish kills in

the Lake and generate possible solution to the crisis. Fishing is a major economic activity for County residents and a major source of income to both the County and National Government hence the matter needs utmost consideration.

- VI. The County should develop policies ensuring that such killed fish are neither consumed by the public nor traded in the Fish market.

CONCLUSION

Mr. Speaker and Hon. Members, the Committee is cognizant of the fact that Fishing is a major Economic activity for County Residents and major source of revenue to the County, thus, any variable with disastrous impacts on the sector deserves priority and prompt recourse.

Mr. Speaker and Hon. Members, the Committee would like to implore this House to deliberate and consider adopting this report and ensure that resolutions passed here are communicated to the Department and effectively implemented.

It is incumbent upon the Hon. Members to adopt this report. I therefore call upon Hon. Ogaga to second.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Yes Hon. Ogaga.

Hon. Ogaga: Thank you Mr. Speaker. I want to thank the committee for good report they did in time and working hand in hand with various authorities as it has been spelt out in the report. I want to thank the Chairperson for always being on toes when duty calls. Mr. Speaker I stand to second the report and I want to say that this was very unfortunate because currently most consumers of fish really prefer the species that was affected that is Nile perch. Most people like it because it is beefy, it is medicinal and it also works well for men thus giving them the energy to perform their duties day and night.

Mr. Speaker, I would also like to say that the quick action that was taken by various authorities was very good and I would like to request the Members to support this report. I cannot forget to say that this affected the women in the market that sell fish meaning that it affected several Households that depended on this. It also affected our children in school since Kisumu County has not disbursed bursaries to support our children in school and therefore most children are sent home. Women are using their small money for their small businesses to take care of their children and to take care of the general up keep of their families. Therefore, I want to say that action should be taken so that generally fish should be taken care of because they affect most people in this community. As it has been mentioned in the report, it is one of the areas that we rely on in our County.

Mr. Speaker, as I have repeated in the past that most of the fish that we consume in Kisumu is imported and therefore the little that we have get affected. Action should be taken so that this does not repeat itself. Thank you.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Thank you Hon. Members. a report from the Standing Committee of Agriculture, Livestock And Fisheries Report On The Statement Raised By Hon. Erick Agolla About The Mysterious Deaths Of Nile Perch Fish In Lake Victoria has been presented by Hon. Otura and second by Hon. Ogaga. I therefore want to propose to put a question that we open the report for debate.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Yes Hon. Khan.

Hon. Khan: Thank you Mr. Speaker. I rise to support this report. As it has been explained in the report it is quite explicit and you can see the committee went far doing their research. Prior to the same being brought to the floor of the House, the County had done some research on the same and they came to a conclusion that this was an issue and a backbone to the economy. I support this report and I want it to be adopted so that we can go a further notch on the same.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Yes Hon. Obonyo.

Hon. Obonyo: Thank you Mr. Speaker. I wish to call the mover to reply.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Okumu): Yes Hon. Otura.

Hon. Otura: Thank you Mr. Speaker. For the first time I liked the speed at which the House has resolve to accept my report. I want to take this opportunity to thank Hon. Ogaga for seconding this motion. I also need to note that actually traders from Kisumu and covering Siaya and Busia where the effect was adverse since the huge number of traders come from Kisumu County.

I wish to thank Hon. Khan for you contribution. I also wish to thank the whole House for supporting the report as read. Thank you.

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Seth Okumu): Thank you. Hon. Members a report from the Standing Committee of Agriculture, Livestock And Fisheries Report On The Statement Raised By Hon. Erick Agolla About The Mysterious Deaths Of Nile Perch Fish In Lake Victoria has been presented by Hon. Otura, second by Hon. Ogaga and debated by Hon. Members. I therefore want to put a question on the adoption of the same?

The Temporary Speaker (Hon. Seth Okumu): Hon. Members the report from the committee of Agriculture, Livestock And Fisheries Report On The Statement Raised By Hon.
